Open Letter to the Congregation about Lunches to Feed the Hungry

Dear Fellow Members of the Synagogue,

As most of you are probably aware, a loyal and intrepid group of our congregation gathers at the Methodist Church every other month on the third Sunday of the month to make bag lunches for the homeless, since Ukiah's community dining hall is closed on the weekends. Many faith communities participate in the weekend program so that one or the other of us makes a lunch each week for Saturday and Sunday and those unfortunates in our community do not go hungry. For many years Cassie Gibson and Dan Hibshman have coordinated this service, and I can't say enough to thank them for their dedication and hard work to make the homeless lunches happen.

I am writing to ask for your help to cover the cost of these lunches. I will explain, but first let me say that if 30 people in the congregation contribute just \$10 per year toward the lunches then it would make a huge difference. Please keep reading. We make 6 lunches a year. Cassie receives a budget of \$120 to make lunch for 100 people each time we do it. I challenge you to make a respectable lunch for 100 people for \$120. The lunch we make consists of a cheese-and-lettuce sandwich on whole wheat bread, a small bag of chips, a chewy granola bar, fruit (as in season), and a bottle of water. With careful shopping, Cassie is able to buy the ingredients for this lunch for about \$180. Cost fluctuates depending on availability of affordable cheese and it can sometimes run more than \$180 for the lunch as a result. Where does the extra money come from? For many years, Cassie quietly took it out of her own pocket. After a while, she mentioned this to the group and others who regularly participate began to contribute to make ends meet.

The lunch we make is bare bones and it is challenging to buy good quality food on such a low budget. If we had a bigger budget we could explore upgrading the quality of the food. Doing the math (which is not my strong suit but I am giving it my best shot), another \$60 per lunch times 6 lunches per year is \$360. I am appealing to you to help us reach a goal of \$300 more per year. (Those of us who make the lunches can handle the additional \$60, or however much we need to spend to get better quality food.)

This fall, when you pay your membership dues for Kol HaEmek, please consider contributing an extra \$10 toward feeding the hungry. When you send your money, just include a note asking David Koppel to put \$10 of your check into the Homeless Lunch Fund. If 30 people do this, we'll hit our goal and it will make a huge difference. What a terrific and easy act of tzedakah. If you have read all the way to the end, thanks so much!

Dear KHE Chaverim,

I CHALLENGE YOU! I challenge you to show up! To make the Holy Days holy for you! Not to write them off because they fall on weekdays this year. Not to put them as secondary to going to work or going to school or whatever you'll also be doing the day before and the day after. Not to rationalize that you're angry at Israel or that being Jewish is irrelevant to you or that the holidays are antiquated and irrelevant and hold no meaning for you.

IT'S UP TO YOU to make, give, and find meaning - it's not up to me, the rabbi, nor the congregation, nor the liturgy, nor the Torah to entertain you or even infuse you with holiness. It's not up to the actions of Israelis or proof or denial of a living God to determine whether you decide to participate in Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur. There's a story about two brothers who wanted to check out if Friday night and Saturday are intrinsically holy or if humans, by celebrating Shabbat, endow the day with kedushah/holiness. So one week they made Shabbat on Wednesday. They did everything as they would have on the traditional seventh day. And they discovered that the Wednesday Shabbat they created was imbued with all the sacred beauty of a classical Shabbat experience. They concluded that WE make Shabbat.

And so it is upon US to consciously opt to look at our past year and as best we can check out the path we've been on and recognize our lacks and make amends and open our bodies, hearts, minds and souls to healing ourselves and the world around us and to celebrate being alive to begin a new year. To do this we need to step outside of our everyday routines! When I was growing up, folks would talk about the Jews who came to services only on the High Holidays. But even these grand, once-a-year holidays don't necessarily draw folks these days. I am distressed when I hear people in KHE opt to let the holy opportunity of these sacred days slide right by, and without skipping a beat go on with their own mundane activities as well as send their children to school. To me, this deprecates the value one assigns to one's deepest/highest self by not taking time and making the effort to pay attention to the larger picture of being alive, to experience the awe and mystery of being alive, human, and Jewish on this planet.

I do not like to be preachy. and I certainly can't dictate to you how to "return to the land of your soul." Hopefully, setting aside your daily tasks, wearing special clothes for these special occasions, singing special songs, being aroused by certain prayers, entering silence, being in community, hearing the shofar, are all modes of supporting you to enter a more expansive and intimate space. But you need to opt to participate. The essential, ancient meaning of Kedushah (linked to Kadosh, Kiddush, Kaddish) is 'dedication.' If something is sacred, holy, it is dedicated - whether to God, or to your marriage partner (in the Jewish wedding ceremony we say, "behold, with this ring you become sacred/Kadosh/dedicated to me." Holiness orients us, sets our intention, our kavanah. And it sets us apart, separates us from that to which we are not dedicated, gives holiness to the purpose and process we commit to.

To what do you want to dedicate yourself and the education of your children? Are you willing to take the opportunity that our Jewish tradition provides on Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur to make yourselves and your children holy vessels, to align with what is of most value to you via participation in our ancient heritage? If a particular practice during services doesn't work for you, it's up to you to make a choice - it's a time-honored Jewish tradition for folks to turn to a text that draws them rather than follow what's being recited on the page. What will help you shed, renew, and "return to the source of it all?"It may be stepping outside to breathe the fresh air, or it may be choosing to spend the day in nature, in study, or in meditation without joining with community at all - though community at its best can help us transcend our small selves. And being with our KHE community plugs us into our much larger Jewish community that crosses time and space. I hope you will avail yourselves and your children of the opportunity to step out of the ordinary to mark this new year of 5776. IT'S UP TO YOU! L'Shanah Tovah / To a Good Year!
