### Tuesday, Aug 7, 7 pm at the Shul: Chevra Kadisha/Holy Burial Society\* Meeting for New and Old Participants

Please come if you have been a member for years, have volunteered one or two times, or if you are curious and think you may be interested in participating. We need to organize for the coming year, so we can continue our sacred task of respectfully preparing the bodies of those who have died, by washing them, giving them their final *mikveh*, and dressing them. Please note that there are important roles you can play in the *Chevra Kadisha* without actually participating in the *tahara* (purification of the body).

We will review what we do and our experiences of this holy work, and clarify the various tasks we need to make sure get done. Shoshanah has usually served as liaison with the bereaved family, the funeral home, and the *Chevra Kadisha*. We need to take over these roles. We need to make sure we have enough people to actually perform the *tahara*. We need to have men and women who can lead the ritual aspects of the *tahara* (Shoshanah usually did this for the women and on occasion for the men as well.) When next of kin (or the person themselves before they died) opt for a *tahara*, we need someone plus a backup who can quickly contact volunteers to round up the needed number of people for the occasion. We need someone to make sure our *tahara* supplies are up to date. The *Chevra Kadisha* also needs to review whether any changes need to happen in our procedures.

Do join us for this meeting! Newcomers: learn what would motivate folks to serve time and again in caring for the dead, and see if you are ready to join in this mitzvah. Veterans: Share your special moments, and offer your suggestions for improving or changing how the *Chevra Kadisha* can best continue to fulfill its functions.

## Chevra kadisha

A *chevra kadisha (Hevra kadishah)* (<u>Aramaic</u>: הֶבְרָה קַדִישָׁא, *Hebh'ra Qaddisha* "holy society") is an organization of <u>Jewish</u> men and women who see to it that the bodies of deceased Jews are prepared for <u>burial</u> according to Jewish tradition and are protected from <u>desecration</u>, willful or not, until burial. Two of the main requirements are the showing of proper respect for a <u>corpse</u>, and the ritual cleansing of the body and subsequent dressing for burial. It is usually referred to as a <u>burial society</u> in English.

The task of the *chevra kadisha* is considered a laudable one, as tending to the dead is a favor that the recipient cannot return, making it devoid of ulterior motives. Its work is therefore referred to as a *chesed shel* <u>emet</u> (<u>Hebrew</u>: חסד של אמת, "*a good deed of truth*"), paraphrased from <u>Genesis 47:30</u> (where <u>Jacob</u> asks his son <u>Joseph</u>, "do me a 'true' favor" and Joseph promises his father to bury him in the burial place of his ancestors).

At the heart of the society's function is the ritual of <u>tahara</u>, or purification. The body is first thoroughly cleansed of dirt, body fluids and solids, and anything else that may be on the skin, and then it is ritually purified by immersion in, or a continuous flow of, water from the head over the entire body. *Tahara* may refer to either the entire process, or to the ritual purification. Once the body is purified, the body is dressed in <u>tachrichim</u>, or shrouds, of white pure muslin or linen garments made up of ten pieces for a male and twelve for a female, which are identical for each Jew and which symbolically recalls the garments worn by the <u>Kohen Gadol</u> (High Priest). Once the body is dressed, the <u>casket</u> is closed. When being buried in <u>Israel</u>, however, a casket is not used.

The society may also provide *shomrim*, or <u>watchers</u>, to guard the body from theft, rodents, or desecration until burial. In some communities this is done by people close to the departed or by paid *shomrim* hired by the <u>funeral home</u>. At one time, the danger of theft of the body was very real; in modern times it has become a way of honoring the deceased.

A specific task for the burial society is tending to the dead who have no immediate next-of-kin. These are termed a*meit mitzvah* (<u>Hebrew</u>: מת מצוה, a <u>mitzvah</u> corpse), as tending to a *meit mitzvah* overrides virtually any other positive <u>commandment</u> (*mitzvat aseh*) of <u>Torah</u> law, an indication of the high premium the Torah puts on the honor of the dead.
