Here are brief biographies of the three women that led KHE services in the month of March. They will will be leading services again in May and June. This will give all of us another opportunity to meet them, and to experience the beautiful energy they each bring to our experience of a Shabbat service.

Mia Zimman is a Jewish educator, spiritual director, and facilitator of lifecycle rituals. She regularly leads Shabbat and holiday services, retreats in Jewish spirituality, kids and family programs, and interfaith dialogue & events. She is a lead educator for Camp Tawonga's B'nai Mitzvah program in San Francisco and works independently as a guide for children in their coming-of-age journey for their B'nai Mitzvahs. Mia studied with Rabbi Shefa Gold for many years and is a graduate of the Kol Zimra chant leadership training. She currently lives in Petaluma, CA, with her husband, Alejandro.

Chaya Gussfield was ordained in the Jewish Renewal Movement in 2006 after serving as a member of the lay spiritual leader team for Kehilla Community Synagogue in Piedmont for many years, then served Beth Chaim Congregation for 7 years as associate Rabbi. She was the interim rabbi for Temple Beth Ora in Edmonton, B.C., and is now serving as a Palliative Care Chaplain for Kaiser Oakland/Richmond. She is still strongly connected to Kehillah. In addition to providing pastoral care and teaching classes, she has coled a special reflective second-day Rosh Hashanah service for over 7 years with her dear friend Eve Decker, a Buddhist dharma teacher and musician. She has a strong *hashpa'ah* practice (individual and group spiritual direction) and enjoys pastoral care. When 19 years old she spent some formative time in Mendocino County (Albion and Caspar and Covelo). Chaya lives in Oakland and has a vacation home in Bodega Bay.

Rayna Miriam Grace is ordained as a Kohenet, a priestess in the Jewish tradition, by the Kohenet Institute. She is a spiritual and ritual leader honoring the sacred earth and the Divine Feminine. She is committed to serving the Jewish people in ways that reflect Jews'ancient roots as people of the land and women's role as spiritual guides. Her prayer tradition includes feminine G*d language and recognizes the physical elements of the world as manifestations of divine presence. Rayna and her family live in Potter Valley.

Shavuot

Shavuot, the "Feast of Weeks," is celebrated seven weeks after_Passover (Pesach). Since the counting of this period (sefirat ha-omer) begins on the second evening of Passover, Shavuot takes place exactly 50 days after the (first) seder. Hence, following the Greek word for "fifty," Shavuot is also referred to sometimes as *Pentecost*. Although its origins are to be found in an ancient grain harvest festival, Shavuot has long been identified with the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai_Shavuot combines two major religious observances. First is the grain harvest of the early summer. Second is the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai seven weeks after the exodus from Egypt. The first determines the ritual for the holiday, which was one of the three pilgrimage festivals of ancient Israel, when Israelite males were commanded to appear before God in Jerusalem, bringing offerings of the first fruits of their harvest. The second determines the significance of the holiday for Judaism, tying it in with the seminal event of Jewish religious memory, namely the entering into a covenant between God and Israel, exemplified by Israel's assumption of Divine law.

Since Shavuot is an ancient pilgrimage holiday, it is not surprising that its ritual focuses on the community. Nonetheless, there are a number of customs associated with personal practice. Chief among them is the eating of dairy products on Shavuot. Although the reasons for this custom are not completely clear, it has become traditional to eat milk and cheese products as part of the celebration of Shavuot.

Much of the observance of the holiday centers on the synagogue and its rituals. The special readings for the holiday include medieval poems (*piyyutim*) and the Book of Ruth. A number of reasons are given for the inclusion of the latter. Among them are that the book takes place at the time of the barley harvest, that Ruth's assumption of Naomi's religion reflects the Israelites' acceptance of the Torah at Sinai, and that King David, who is alleged to have died at this time of year according to rabbinic tradition, is mentioned at the end of Ruth. Another tradition is to participate in a *Tikkun Leil Shavuot*, an all-night study session marking the holiday. And finally, Shavuot is one of the holidays on which both *Hallel*, the Psalms of Praise, is recited and *Yizkor*, the memorial service, is observed.

Mushroom turnovers

<u>Dough-</u> 3-3 oz packages of cream cheese, room temp.; 1/2 c. butter, room temp.; 1 &1/2 c. flour

- 1) Mix cream cheese & butter well. Add flour and work until smooth. Chill dough at least for 30 minutes.
- 2) Preheat oven to hot (450 degrees)
- 3) Roll dough to 1/8 in. thickness on a lightly floured surface. Cut dough into circles using a floured waterglass
- 4) Place 1 teaspoon mushroom filling on each and fold the dough over the filling. Press edges together with a fork. Prick top to allow steam to escape.
- 5) Place on ungreased cookie sheet and bake until brown about 15 minutes.

Mushroom filling:

3 tablespoons butter 1/2 t. salt

1 large onion, finely chopped freshly ground black pepper to taste

1/2 lb. mushrooms, chopped 2 Tb. flour

1/4 t. thyme 1/4 cup sweet or sour cream

1) In a skillet, heat the butter, add the onion, & brown lightly. Add the mushrooms & cook, stirring often for 3 minutes.


