She has two couples meet a couple times a week for 2 or 3 months, to share a meal and learn communication skills. Clear goals are set and monitored. Physical therapists are present to evaluate and train patients.

Nancy dreamed this one up all by her lonesome. It's been going a couple of years--here and nowhere else. Unique program, innovative and reproducible elsewhere.

The point is: she's documented her work and has been invited to present it to a national audience at the annual convention of Speech Pathologists this fall in Philadelphia.

This is a very big deal: local girl taking the national stage in front of her professional peers."

In My Opinion:

How does one prepare for Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur? My mind tells me I should review the year, read holy texts, at least Deuteronomy, and make goals for the coming year. Then I laugh, and think about what I really do. What really happens, what the Holidays really mean to me.

I start out doors (if it's not too hot). Cut the grass, pull some weeds, cut back the hedges so kids going to school can walk on the side walk. As time permits I move indoors to vacuum, clean out drawers and closets. As I start to straighten my closet I think about what shall I wear to Shul. Shall I be my normal comfy self, take clothes seriously like my mother did, maybe follow the Aquarian Minyan tradition of whatever, as long as it's white?

I look into my closet and unexpectedly out comes a lifetime review! All the Yom Tov's of my life appear, sometimes in order, sometimes as a holiday scramble!

A child visiting grandparents in Shul and not having a clue. The embarrassment of being sent to school and finding 5-10 non-Jewish kids there who say, If you're not Irish or Italian, you must be Jewish. Pulling down the window shades before eating on Yom Kippur as my mother insisted. The beauty of my mother-in-law's holiday table. Insuring that my husband had a Holiday service to attend no matter where we lived. Reading the list of sins and realizing how few I had yet experienced. The difficulty of fasting and feeding babies chicken soup with noodles. The look on my children's faces as we asked them to skip a bedtime snack because it was Erev Yom Kippur. Attending reform services with my husband and children, leaving temple and breaking the fast with orange juice and challah and then driving to my in-laws to set out the family break-fast. The glorious smell of coffee brewing after a fast.

The magic of Yom Tov in Mendocino with Hanan, the long drive home to Colin and Deborah's delicious soup. The decision-making of which congregation to attend in the Bay Area, so many choices. Then the return to Ukiah and the Kol HaEmek years! Shall we continue to have services with Shefa Gold? Shall we find a resident Rabbi? Will we continue to rent or have services in our own little Shul? Where will we find chairs? Will we have a full house or too full a house? Who will bring the apples? Did I forget anything important? Will the congregation be content? How will I make it better?

Each Holiday I bring my life to the service, each stage of my life, each year's experiences, each year's blessings and losses. If the services give me hope and a sense of my place in the world, I'm content and able to cheerfully face the adventures of the year to come.

May this year's Holiday fill us all with the joy of the continuity of Jewish life and a sense of our place in this, our Community.

P.S. It's time to start practicing for the High Holidays!!

Dear KHE Chaverim,

In my last *Shema* column, I mentioned the importance of the cycle of seven in our Jewish heritage. This applies as well to our High Holidays, which fall in the seventh month of Tishrei, beginning with Rosh HaShanah on the first day of the new month. Yes, a bit confusing that the "head of the year," i.e., Rosh HaShanah, also marks the beginning of the 7th month in the calendar, but so it is. This is because Nisan, which marks the beginning of spring and the holiday of Pesach, is traditionally counted as the first month of the calendrical year.* Nisan (whose name comes to us from our Babylonian exile two and a half millenia ago) is called in the Torah by the name of Aviv, which literally means "spring." It's not difficult to associate the green vitality of springtime with new beginnings. But then count through the succeeding months of Iyar, Sivan, Tammuz, Av, Elul, and we're ready for a shabbaton, a seventh month, a shift. The harvest is in, to be celebrated during Succot in this seventh month of Tishrei, and it's time to take a break.

Each time we sing "V'Shamru" before the Shabbat kiddush, the words remind us that God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh (oovayom hashvee'ee shavat vayinafash). Shavat is the same root as Shabbat and Shabbaton; God is taking a break. Yinafash is the verb form of nefesh, which means both breath and soul. So God is taking a breath, a breather, in order to resoul. We can look at the holidays of Tishrei in the same light. We need to stop. Only then can we look back and take an accounting of our acts, in their most detailed and broadest aspects, over the past months. With a little perspective now, what HAVE we created? And where do we want to go from here?

Before answering this last question, we need to let go. We need to be present and relax from the momentum of creating. We're told that each Shabbat we receive our *neshamah yeterah* - more of our soulbeing comes to us, our essence of who we really are, which at its root is God. This is *tshuvah*, return. And this is what we are called to in a big way each time the High Holidays come around. Yom Kippur is sometimes described as the Sabbath of Sabbaths. We give ourselves over utterly to letting go of whatever grit is in the way of our connecting with the One. How wonderful that we have a way to acknowledge that we have erred, and to ask for and be granted forgiveness, so that self-condemnation does not need to separate us from our purity and holiness. We empty out - no work, no eating, no sex, no bathing, no leather, no perfumed oils (21st Century: no telephone, no computer, etc), so that nothing can distract us from simply being aligned with and supported by our deepest/highest Being on this day.

As on Shabbat, when we let go and release, then we can be filled with Divine Presence. This influx energizes us, nourishes us, so that our joy emerges fully as we enter into our celebration of Succoth. We enjoy the blessing and beauty of the harvest festival, and appreciate our deep dependence on the earth and its bounty, and yet the flimsy succah we have built reminds us of our true home in God. These holidays have brought us to a remembering that God is within and without - and among us, for we congregate and experience these days of awe as a community during this seventh month. And then we bid goodbye to this cycle with Simchat Torah, the joy of the Torah, when we scroll back to the beginning. We're starting afresh, and we have Torah to show us the way. A living Torah, to inspire us and guide us and be interpreted and applied by us as we move ahead into the new year.

L'Shanah Tovah! Looking forward to experiencing this seventh month with you! And, once again, if you are harboring any complaint, hurt, grudge, whatever, that needs clearing with me before the Holidays, please contact me so we can lighten that burden. I ask your forgiveness for any ways in which I have knowingly or unknowingly wronged you.
