In My Opinion:

Someone pointed out to me that when I'm really busy under and under pressure I turn into my mother. My mother could really be unpleasant when she knew what was right and everyone else was wrong!

We are a volunteer organization. Yes, we have a very part-time Rabbi and one of our five Sunday school teachers receives a stipend. Everything else is done by people who share their time and their skills. They also share their particular style of leadership or follow-through. If we don't have a volunteer to accomplish a particular job, it's simply not completed.

Volunteers often show up at their convenience and stay until they are needed elsewhere. Sometimes they act like they have to be in total control and treat others without enough respect for their skills and strengths. Some volunteers are so laid back they appear to be asleep or never tell you what they need or want.

Sometimes I think I miss the reliability of paid staff. Then I remember working for the City of Berkeley and remember paid staff with Attitude.

Thank goodness we don't often have volunteers with attitude. We do have volunteers with very soft feelings and when they don't feel appreciated they soon go elsewhere, where they do feel appreciated.

So to all of you unsung helpers: we do appreciate you! We would not have a Jewish community without you, and if something or someone bothers you, speak up to a board member. We promise to keep a confidence and hopefully take corrective action. But please remember that we are volunteers as well and not always able to change how people relate to each other.

Board and Members Ponder Possibilities of Shul Building Addition

Thanks to a generous donation by Milton Rosen (Norm Rosen's father) and a gift from another family, KHE has received a goodly sum of money intended for an addition to our Shul.

The Board of Directors of KHE, before embarking on such a project, wants very much to hear from community members regarding what they see as the needs of our building and our congregation. Furthermore, we want to know whether other families are willing to support this project with donations of money, time and involvement.

From discussions among board members and with other interested members, here is a compilation of what we have learned so far...

Statements:

Building is too crowded on High Holidays--we need *some* additional space.

Rather than pay for rentals (for bnai mitzvahs, for example) at other sites, families could give the money to the Shul if it had more room.

A folding door (or wall) is important so we can be cozy when we are just a few.

The classrooms are too small.

I like it crowded on High holidays--it's wasteful to build a sanctuary.

We need storage rather than another room.

We need to question the current membership and gather their support and ideas.

Questions:

Can we enlarge the rooms in the current facility?

Can we enlarge the building to the rear rather than than at the side?

We need to have support from the membership: are current members willing to donate money to an addition? Should we create a Building Fund Pledge?

Do we believe the Jewish congregation is truly growing or is the next generation leaving town?

If growth is inevitable, will future Jews be satisfied with a building in Redwood Valley, and not want a Willits building and a Ukiah building?

Will the price of gas restrict attendance?

If we build a new room, will we have to increase parking and make a commercial kitchen?

How much will our utility and maintenance costs change with an addition?

We need to know how much changes will cost, and the Board needs to be in control of the process.

We don't want things started and left unfinished.

Dear KHE Chaverim,

I took great delight in preparing the class I recently taught on our Jewish Heritage in Iraq (Babylon) and Iran (Persia). What a rich topic. These countries, which seem so alien and unenlightened to many today, were a center of world civilization and home to us Jews over many centuries. We got there over 2600 years ago, when Babylon destroyed Jerusalem (including Solomon's Temple) and sent us into exile, which actually meant moving us from provincial Judea (hence the name "Jew") closer to the big cultural center which had been developing for millenia between the Tigris and Euphrates rivers (from whence Abraham's family had set forth for Canaan over a thousand years earlier).

"By the waters of Babylon, there we sat down, and there we wept, when we remembered Zion" (Psalm 137). The prophets among us helped us to remember Zion and look forward to a rebuilt Jerusalem one day, while comforting us in our new surroundings and opening us up to mystical visions. Did you know that the prophet Ezekiel was sent from Jerusalem to the Babylonian village of Tel Aviv? This physical trip prompted Ezekiel to take quite a few trips of another nature, and his heavenly visions created a template for Jewish mysticism for millenia to come. His fellow prophet Isaiah encouraged his compatriots in exile by refocusing their dislocation in being torn from their homeland to Israel's role as "a light unto the nations." And then we learn of Daniel, who like Joseph a thousand years earlier and Mordechai a few generations later, rose to become the number one ruler of his host country, subordinate to only the king. Daniel set a precedent for Mordechai when he refused to bow down or serve strange gods in his new home. Lots more to say about Daniel, whose dream interpretation skills succeeded even when the king wanted to understand a dream he couldn't recall-- but you'll have to read the book to find out!

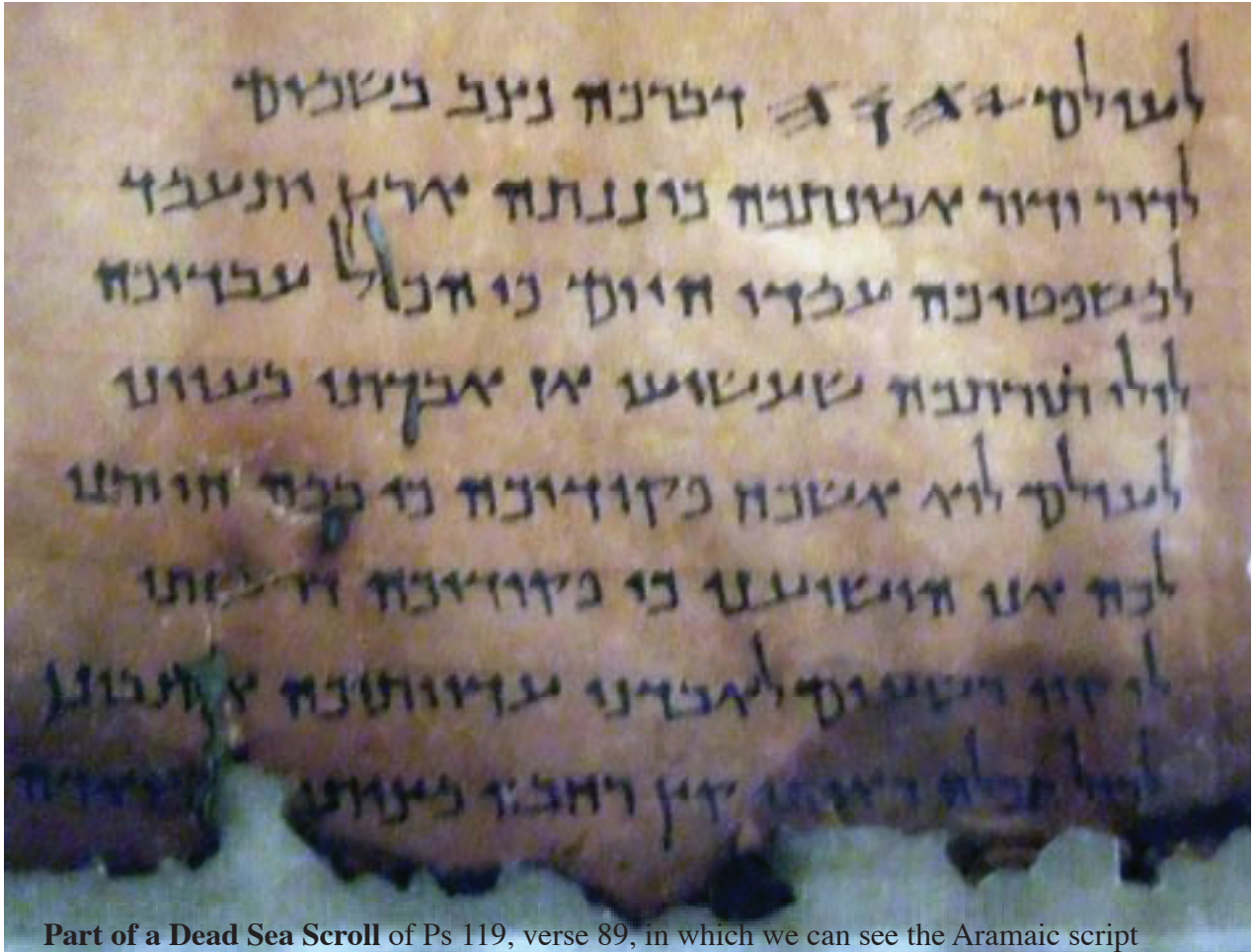
From the Babylonians and the Persians, we learned to practice Judaism without a Temple or sacrificial offerings, to focus on prayer, and to gather together to worship and study in what later came to be known as synagogues. The scribal profession became important as a way of keeping the old texts and language alive, and merit and learning came to be valued more than the contributions of an inherited priestly class. As you can see, the precedents of Jewish life in the Diaspora took shape for us back then, back there. When the Persians under Cyrus permitted the Jews to return to Judea and rebuild Jerusalem and the Temple, only a small minority opted to do so.

From the Esther story, we learn that at times Jews (Esther herself) thought it advantageous not to reveal one's ethnic origin. We also learn that Jews were scattered throughout the Persian empire which extended from Cush (Ethiopia) to Hodoo (India), and that we had a reputation for keeping our own laws. And we learn that large numbers of folks found it advantageous to convert to Judaism. And then all of us, Jews and non-Jews alike, were exposed to Hellenism, which swept through Babylon and Persia in the wake of the conquests of Alexander the Great (who died in Babylon in 323 BCE). Under Hellenist and later Roman rule (which did not extend to Persia), Jerusalem and the Temple once again became centers of pilgrimage for Jews, now not from just the Land of Israel, but from all the stretches of the Diaspora.

So we see the famous Rabbi Hillel making his way on foot as an unknown young man from Babylonia to study in Jerusalem, where at first he was too poor to pay the fee to enter the study hall, and where he later rose to become the leading rabbi of his generation, influential and inspirational right down to our day.

Almost six centuries of life under a succession of empires had not quenched Jewish loyalty to Torah and Jerusalem. This minuscule sketch of our ancient heritage will stop right here for this month. We'll take up next month with the next 2000 years of Jewish life in Iraq and Iran. Let me conclude with Rabbi Hillel's wonderful saying: If I am not for myself, who will be for me; If I am for myself only, what am I? If not now, then when?
